Martin State was the home of the Glenn L. Martin aircraft factory. Your seaplane will be moored in the lagoon where the China Clippers were launched 60 years ago. Note the paved runway to the right of the factory.

Bring your family. There are activities for "kids" of all ages. There is music, contests, arts and crafts and much more for the family.



Aircraft of all types will be on display including gliders, helicopters, warbirds, classics, experimentals and ultralights.



Take a walk back in time. See the contributions to aviation, and actual aircraft made by the Glenn L. Martin factory. Many of the original factory workers still live in the area and are eager to share their stories.



The Martin Mars is the largest production seaplane ever made. (see back cover). Land, taxi and park where these giants once did.
